To qualify you must be within the first 50% of all starters or within 1 ½ times the winner's time in the results on the same colour course, 3 times in any 2 years.

For WHITE courses you only need to complete the course 3 times.

STRING COURSE (PURPLE) is for any young person who does not already hold any other colour award, and who has completed 3 string courses.

To obtain a colour coded badge award please let me have the 3 dates on which you qualified (anywhere in Britain) and £1 for Juniors (20 & under) or £2 for Seniors (21 & over). GALOPPEN SCORING

Once again we have come to the end of another season. The final tables and prize-winners are to be found elsewhere in SINS. Our scoring system for a few years now has been based on the winner's time in each class but it has been pointed out to us that this creates a particular anomaly. For instance Jack Speed, a GB senior squad runner, wants to do some speed training in preparation for a forthcoming sprint race and decides to run green instead of brown. Inevitably he wins by a large margin and affects the points of all other runners. Jack never runs green at a galoppen again that season. This has the effect that this particular race probably becomes a throwaway for many competitors on that course. Each year there are several scenarios like this on different courses where the winner, for whatever legitimate reason, wins by a big margin on what is possibly not their normal course.

There is a possible solution to this problem but it has its drawbacks. At the moment we operate on a system where no-one can win a prize unless they have completed 3 galoppens in that particular colour. If we extend this idea and say no-one can score any points unless they have completed 3 galoppens in a colour it would take Jack's time out of the scoring system. This would be done by removing the appropriate names from the list at the end of the season. If any of these names are event winners the points for that particular race would have to be recalculated. The drawback of this system is that although each event will still be scored in the usual way as we go along, the final rescoring might mean that some positions could change. The advantage is that Jack can still run the green - we do not want to stop anyone running whatever colour they wish - but the regulars on the course would still have a fair score. Your tactics for the final few events might need rethinking!

We are rather against the suggestion that we ask everybody to register at the beginning of a season for their chosen course and if you are not registered you can't score. This seems somewhat bureaucratic and non-inclusive. We like the idea that everybody is scored from the word go and if people want to change courses they can do.

We have thought long and hard about various other solutions and are trying to balance out simplicity with fairness. We are very open to changing the system but would like as much feedback as possible before we do so. ORIENTEERING IN BRITISH UNIVERSITIES AND COLLEGES

I read with great interest the items on Orienteering in Edinburgh and Sheffield. Universities published recently in CompassSport. Such energy and purpose.

No wonder they have success on the National scale. Have a glance at the relay results for the JK and British and see how many times ShUOC and EUOC are in the top 10 Clubs - nay in the top 2-3.

Is Orienteering doing well in the other British Universities and Colleges?

In the recently promoted 2050 Conference in the South West, "What would Orienteering be like in 40 years time?", I invited anyone under 30 to come.

Five came with a couple of others who could not come but expressed interest. James Head who wrote the item that appeared in a recent edition of SINS was one. They were by chance a couple of undergraduates, a post graduate and two recent graduates who happened to be married to one another.

I was shattered to learn that orienteering is not well in most British Universities. There are some 290 Universities and Colleges affiliated to British Universities and Colleges Sport (BUCS).

There are eight Universities affiliated to BOF(2011) - Edinburgh, Sheffield, Oxford, Cambridge, Durham, Queens Belfast, Bristol and Newcastle. They take part in the BUCS Orienteering Championships. Individuals can also run in the BUCS Championships. Last year there were individual entries from Bangor, Sheffield Hallam, Imperial, Birmingham, Bath, Surrey, Southampton and Exeter.

Unfortunately Clubs from Birmingham; Warwick; Nottingham; London; Manchester; Imperial have disappeared in the last year. Sixteen from a total of 290 Universities and College affiliated to BUCS - not a great number.

I learnt that there are a number of possible reasons.

To form a University Sports Club you have to have at least 20 members - some even ask for 30.

To be a member of any Club you have to join the Athletic Union of your University with the subsequent cost. If you can pass that hurdle then you have the facilities of the University Union at your feet.

You will of course appreciate that the University population is a shifting one with most students only being there for 3 or 4 years. If there is no existing Club then it takes a lot of energy to form one even if they have been a keen Orienteer in say a Regional Junior Squads. They also have to actually do some work – that's why they are there. Ed Nicholas the BOF Development Manger has tried to draw up a list of Orienteers going to University and link them together.

An important factor is that University students in the main do not have wheels. It is expensive to run a car and if you have only recently qualified the insurance can be horrendous. One advantage of an affiliated Club in the University is that they can have access to minibuses.

Could the local Club help ? Yes

1 Firstly by organising lifts to events.

2 It might also be helpful if the Clubs organised Introductory Events on the University or College Campus during Freshers weeks that starts every Academic year.

3 To organise some of their local events within reasonable distance of the campus in the first few month of the academic year. This may encourage other students to try the sport.

How can the students help themselves?

1 Many already remain members of their home Club.

2 They could join the local Club.

3 If you want to find out if there are any other orienteers at your University send your name to Ed Nicholas at BOF Office.

There are many related activities in the University. Fell running, Mountaineering Cross Country.

One idea being explored is to form an Outdoor Pursuits Club which would contain an Orienteering section.

One glimmer of light is that many of the Colleges, particularly those that have an agricultural history, have PE programmes in their curriculum and some already have Orienteering. There may be an opportunity for the local Club to producing a map of the Campus giving the Club another area to run on as well as encouraging the College to add Orienteering to their curriculum.

I know of four here in the South West. Those of you that came to Bicton College for the JK 2010 ran on just such an area. Cornwall run on Duchy College, Callington and NGOC are just finishing revising a map of Hartpury College near Gloucester. Wimborne have a map of Kingstone Murward in Dorset.

There is a great untapped reservoir of talent out there with probably 500,000 students to be encouraged to come and try our great sport.

PEARCES AT THE BRITISH CHAMPIONSHIPS – SOUTH YORKSHIRE 2011

The British Championships were held this year close to Sheffield; the individual event being held on Wharfecliffe and Greno Woods, and the Relays on the nearby Tankersley Wood.

John and I drove up on the Friday afternoon, neatly dodging traffic jams on the M5 and M42 on the way. Our orienteering in Sheffield itself was abysmal – not helped by my having left the map to the Travelodge at home. I got us into the circle... but it took several U turns, an earnest conversation with a man in a garage, and a sneaky look at the Sheffield AtoZ (without buying it!) to eventually land up at our base for the weekend.

We should have had a longer lie-in on the Saturday morning. As it was, we arrived in the car parking field a full 4 hours before we were due to run, with a gale blowing outside. Nothing much to do other than read the newspaper and do the crossword. At length

we ambled the 800m or so to Assembly where finding shelter from the wind was the main priority. We couldn't find any Devon members, so took shelter in the Happy Herts tent (well, our daughter and imminent son in law belong to HH so we thought they wouldn't mind...). Then what do you do about lunch when your start time is 1.44? Can't run on a rumbly tummy – nor on a full one either. So we nibbled at sandwiches and sipped from the coffee flask until it was time to head to the Start. On the way I met up with some of our Scottish orienteering friends, and while exchanging information about families, weddings and grandchildren almost missed my call-up.

I remember a rather rough run to the start flag, during which I just about got the map folded. Then headlong into the wood and a load of brashings. The orienteering was interesting in this section: rough ground, mountain bike tracks (not all mapped), forestry extraction lanes, and a leg dangerously close to the edge of the map. Better orienteers than I (to wit Carol McNeill) ran off the map at this point. I was luckier and enjoyed the controls popping up in front of me more or less where I expected them to. Then the road crossing, and a timed-out minute. I had planned to have a nice rest at this point and plan the next few legs, but panicked a bit and set off again having only used up 32 seconds. We then had a number of legs through an area liberally strewn with thickets. I fluffed the easiest of these (blame an unmapped path...) but otherwise was OK. The leg between controls 12 and 13 was more than a kilometre and involved crossing quite a deep valley. There were at least 2 viable routes; I took the southern one which involved more climb but easier orienteering in that there were tracks to follow nearly all of the way. Then a short section through a moss-covered boulder field where I encountered Devon member Vivienne Maxwell; we exchanged a moan about the tough terrain, then on again to the final section. I chose a route that used a metalled track - easy orienteering and suited to a fast runner (which I am not!). This was where the eventual winner Sheila Carey was able to make good speed – her Olympic racing stood her in good stead. Then what seemed an interminable run round the Assembly field finishing with an uphill section (how sadistic is that!). At this point neither Carol McNeill nor Sheila Carey had come in, so for a short while I held an impressive winning margin. But it wasn't to last; Sheila came in about a minute quicker. Carol's foray off the map and under the control descriptions had cost her too much, and she was about 3 minutes down on my time. So second place – which gained me a carrier bag and a new pair of socks which was nice.

I wasn't affected by nesting birds in the forest, but several of the longer courses had to be re-routed past enlarged out of bounds areas, due to the discovery of nesting raptors – goshawks I believe. John's course went close, but it didn't affect his route choice. He went steadily round M65 and, without running much - or so he says - finished in 13th position. And our daughter won W35L so will have to keep a handsome silver rose bowl polished.

With only 3 DEVON OC adults available (John and me, and Nicholas Maxwell) we made up a Mixed Ad Hoc team for Sunday's relays. The wooded areas included a lot of tricky detailed stuff – relic of a quarrying past - then there were exposed legs on a more open heathland/farmland area. It would be fair to say that none of us had a particularly fine run; but we enjoyed the fresh air and made up the numbers. The DEVON youngsters in their M14 and Junior Ad Hoc classes did rather better. Like orphans in a storm we again sought shelter from the chilly wind with another club, and KERNO kindly took us in. To my astonishment I found myself surrounded there by fellow Cumbrians and fellow supporters of Carlisle United FC! Small world.....
